Katepwa Lake levels rose at the beginning of November, when Sask Watershed Authority closed the weir at Highway #56 Bridge. This was expected.

Last Mountain Lake is still approximately 2 ft above its normal level for this time of year and there is a lot of water that will be coming through the lakes and through the system. Officials advise that the water system is draining naturally, and levels for Katepwa Lake are presently forecast for a slightly higher than normal for the spring, as long as we have a normal precipitation and snowfall. ATV PROPOSED BYLAW



Some residents combined resources to order 3400 lineal feet of water berm from ABC Canada Waterbloc Waterberms. Residents are commended for taking the steps to minimize potential damage in the future.

OUR LAGOON - NOT LIMITLESS AND NOT PRICELESS

I'm going to take you on a bit of a journey to discuss our Lagoon; the how, why and ugly of the whole thing. The numbers quoted may not be precise; however they are close enough for this purpose.

Our current Lagoon was developed in 1981 to meet the design needs of 45 permanent families and about 350 seasonal residents. Today, this Lagoon services 150 permanent residence and 850 seasonal folks – about three times as many people as it was designed for!

Before we start, and with all due respect here's 'lagoon operating 101'. The District of Katepwa does NOT have a sewage treatment system, it has a lagoon. This means that we are all our own waste water managers – when your waste water goes into your septic tank and it's full, you have to call your preferred 'septic hauler', 'honey wagon', 'yesterday's meals on wheels', 'pooper palace pumper', 'reading room rejuvenator' etc. to have it emptied. Under normal conditions, septic haulers show up, pump you out and you're back in operation!

Not so simple. On a busy weekend day, the septic trucks haul about 40-50, 2,500 gallon loads to our 1981 lagoon. That's 125,000 gallons per day or a quarter of a million gallons on the weekend! This waste settles and, by design, flows from the primary lagoon cell to the secondary cell whereby the sun and wind evaporates the liquids, and solids break down. Fortunately, the location of our lagoon is such that it gets maximum sun and wind exposure so that evaporation keeps the level down and we can be, well... 'good to go'!

Our lagoon system has held up marvelously since it was first opened. However, this past spring the lagoon was "breached" (overflowed), partly due to abnormally high precipitation, and from too much product (if we can call it that). These situations result in the lagoon being CLOSED, no choice. What will folks do if the lagoon is closed? Without septic options, a declared emergency is triggered meaning that septic clean outs are slowed or stopped altogether. If you're a summer resident you go back whence you came once your tank is full. If the lake is your only home you need to move out when you can no longer use your septic systems.

While temporary solutions were found last summer, those are no longer viable. The time has come for a long term sustainable solution – create a new lagoon that is relatively close to the District that will accommodate population fluctuations and continue to allow the septic trucks to be efficient in their hauling, keeping costs down. We also encourage residents to be more frugal with their waste water – perhaps consider a low flush toilet, reduced shower times, etc. extending the lifespan of the lagoon.

A new lagoon has a few things it must satisfy before it can be built. We look for land that is acceptable to the Ministry of Environment, meets the by-laws of the RM of Abernethy where it will likely be situated, has approved engineered drawings, meets environmental concerns, arrive at a satisfactory arrangement between the District and the land owner we purchase land from, and has a design satisfies the needs of the District just to name a few! Once we have been able to meet the obligations, we can proceed with building the new lagoon. As you can see, the timing of this is dependent on too many things to be predicted with certainty. We do know that we do not have time on our side.

Also, to do all of this, we need to have a sizeable sum of money, an amount based on land costs, equipment and manpower as well as the availability of the special 'mud' to line the cells. Council is finding ways to meet the financial demands of a new lagoon.

All of this is time consuming and weighs heavily on our minds. It comes down to a simple fact..... No Lagoon.... No District of Katepwa Beach.

p.s. Save water!

See you at the lake!

VALE MINES INTERESTED IN KATEPWA RESOURCES

Southern Saskatchewan is seeing action in the booming potash industry and it may directly affect the District of Katepwa. The Brazilian mining company Vale is currently conducting a pre-feasibility study for creation of a potash mine between White City and Kronau. The location is currently on privately owned farm land and the company is in the process of acquiring portions of this land. What does that have to do with Katepwa? Water for the project may be coming from Katepwa Lake - a lot of it! A decision on whether to build the mine is expected in 2012 and if Vale receives approval, pipe line construction would begin in 2013. Council is working to keep abreast of the project and taking all steps possible to be involved in the process, managing the impact to the community, most importantly the lake. Updates will be provided to Katepwa ratepayers as it becomes available to Council.

PUBLIC WORKS – DISTRICT ROAD REPAIR

Road repair in our district has been a struggle due to difficulty hiring a contractor, availability of that contractor and weather conditions for completions of the work. The work was further challenged by the floods this year which has resulted in additional repairs needing to be done.

The good news is we have received positive information regarding financial assistance with the repairs from Provincial Disaster Assistance Program (PDAP). This combined with some funds that Council has earmarked for road repair puts us in a favorable position to get needed repairs done. The bad news is that contractors are in short supply, so no guarantees on when the work can be completed.

Ongoing road gravelling and minor hole repair will continue as budget allows, with more extensive road repair anticipated in the following areas:

Sandy Beach: Park Street; Andros Avenue;

Edwyn Street

East Maples: Maple Lane; Osment Drive

West Maples: Osment Drive (west side)

Katepwa: Regina Avenue; Upland Drive

Katepwa South Road: project underway with

completion in 2012.

BUDGET TIME

Councillors will be sharpening their pencils more than ever for the 2012 budget year. What is facing the District? The two big ticket items are construction of a new lagoon, including land purchase, and major road repairs. Those two items alone are expected to cost nearly \$2 million. We are in better shape than many other Districts in the province, as we have been putting funds aside for some time. Still, this is a small tax base (about 1000 rate payers) and we will have to look at ways to fund these in order to complete the projects in short order.

To set the financing in place we look at a onetime levy on each property or borrowing the funds and financing the infrastructure improvements over time. The difference is that financing has an interest cost attached so as a Council we weigh the options and work with the one best suited to the Districts situation. Certainly, considerations are being given to how these options will impact the ratepayers. Information will be distributed to ratepayers throughout the entire process and posted on the district website.

JUNKED VEHICLES NEED TO GO!


The obvious benefit of a clean and properly maintained yard is that it enhances the overall appearance of the District. Benefits that may not be as obvious include improved neighbor/neighborhood relations; reduction of rodent infestation; and being more attractive to potential residents by pride in ownership.

Council is actively pursuing the maintenance of District owned properties for the betterment of everyone, and junked vehicles continue to be an eyesore of the community. This includes any automobile, tractor, truck, trailer or other vehicle that either has no valid license plates attached to it or is inoperative or abandoned condition located on private land or district land. (Full bylaw details can be found on www.katepwabeach.ca).

Have a good look around your property, if you have a vehicle (or part of one) that falls into one of these descriptions you may want to make plans to have it properly dealt with or removed before the Bylaws Enforcement Officer knocks on your door. Your property and the District of Katepwa Bylaws are somewhat intertwined and work will continue on enforcement of the bylaws in the coming year. The general administrative process of issuing bylaw violations or infractions is -

- First Notice: This is your one time free visit where you will be provided a *Notice of Infraction*. The Notice will detail the steps that you will need to take within a prescribed timeline to rectify your property.
- 2) Second Notice: \$25 fee levied at the end of the prescribed timelines if you fail to address the requirements outlined in the First Notice.
- 3) Any other official notices that have to be issued as a result of noncompliance with the Notice of Infraction is \$150.00/official visit. All default payments will be applied to the owner's property taxes along with any additional cost incurred by the District to address the cleanup/ removal of items listed in the Notice of Infraction and/or additional administrative expenses.

You may be saying to yourself, "why should I have to clean up my yard, when the District doesn't clean up their properties"? Council is actively pursuing the maintenance of District owned properties, all the while prioritizing the key infrastructure of the District. Keep in mind that, a town becomes a community when it pulls together to attain a common ground; that common ground in this instance, is a safe and pleasant environment for our residents and their families to reside. Please be a part of the community and do your part.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE COMMITTEE UPDATE

We are happy to report that in the time since the floods, all debris at East Maples and Sandy Beach has been removed and both areas are cleaned up and back to pre-flood condition.

Communication with Provincial Disaster Assistance Program (PDAP) has been ongoing and information is being gathered on potential Rebate Programs for 2012. Recently, we had the opportunity to give the PDAP Engineer a tour of the lake and district to see the damaged locations first hand. This included damage to roads, culverts, shorelines and the lagoon. We also showed the Engineer the locations of the sand bag walls and water berms. This formed the basis of a claim submitted to PDAP. Good news - we have just received notification that the claim has been accepted and reimbursement for the repair of road damage will be supported by PDAP. As you can see, Glenda Hodson, Administrator, and I have been busy!

Planning is always ongoing and work continues on the Katepwa Emergency Response Plan. Your input is essential as we move through the development of this plan. A meeting will be scheduled in the near future for all residents and volunteers that participated in the formal Emergency Operations Center process, specialized Committees, and Site Managers to discuss (or debrief) on a lot of good things that went on and an opportunity to identify how we may be able to do some things better, for the future. This will help us as we formalize the Katepwa Emergency Plan.
