UPDATES FROM MAYOR PATTISON

It has been four months since the last newsletter. The number of hours that have been spent on your behalf and the District's cannot be displayed in these few words. Your council is working together very well, with all members contributing towards a common goal.

As laid out in the previous newsletter, Council had identified several issues that needed to be addressed. Here is an update on what has been going on:

- Implementation of Group Email Discussions with all of council which has created daily dialogue on District affairs. All of the council members are contributing to early solutions and our monthly meetings are being completed timely, as all of our homework has been done ahead of time. Completed
- A "new" Digital Newsletter with substantial cost reductions.
 Completed
- Lakeside Subdivision road slump repair, completed at a fraction of the proposed cost. Completed
- Road allowances this is a common issue at all resort areas. Information is being collected from other Districts and Government Agencies to determine a fair solution for all rate payers. *Ongoing*
- Meetings with Environment Ministry to complete an agreement on the landfill and to have a multiyear plan put in place.

Should be completed within the month of February

- Agreement with Trans Canada Trail Group, to assist in cost of repairing walking bridge along Highway 56.
 Completed
- Adoption of improved service agreements for new developments. Completed
- Adoption of new guidelines for building permits.
 In progress

- Agreement with Department of Highways regarding road restrictions for #56 Highway and to allow proper permitting for essential truck traffic. Completed
- Complete review of all District expenditures with a "new" Financial Plan to be announced.
 To be completed in month of February.
- Discussions with Province for elimination of upstream pollutants into the Qu'Appelle Valley. *Completed*
- Discussions with Lebret on better utilization of Katepwa lagoon, easing pressure on Lebret's Lagoon. This should eliminate the need to dump effluent into waterway. *Ongoing*
- Commence pilot project with Watersheds Canada and The Lower Qu'Appelle Watershed on a program which is the first in Saskatchewan, called "Love Your Lake". You can check it out at www.loveyourlake.ca. More info to follow
- Discussions with Parks, regarding improved parking and additional pier at Main Beach to improve traffic flow during peak boating times. *Ongoing*
- Our District administrator, Gail Sloan, is moving on!
 This very important position has been filled with the new person starting in mid March. Introductions will take place upon completion of all previous employment details.

 Completed
- Discussions have been started with a major internet supplier for improved internet and possible television programming. *Ongoing*
- Stay tuned for *Very Exciting News* in the near future, regarding the District's Long Term Debt.

PUBLIC WORKS

Public works will be doing road maintenance this spring. The roads that were dust proofed last year will be redone this year. The amount of rain we have in the spring will dictate when it will be applied, likely sometime late May- early June. All other gravel roads will be assessed for gravelling and possibly dust proofing. The parking area in East Maple (known as ground zero) will have new signage - it will read Resident parking - 72 hours, No camping. Other parking areas in the District will be reviewed this spring.

ACTION TO LIMIT UPSTREAM POLLUTANTS

Calling Lakes District Planning Commission had a meeting with Premier Brad Wall and Deputy Premier Don McMorris in November. They received a letter stating that the Premier supports us in protecting our water by working with the Water Security Agency (WSA) to insure City of Regina follow the regulations.

Katepwa has its own brand of Poplar! This poplar is male and does not have the cotton seeds. We have learned how powerful the poplar tree is at drinking nitrogen and holding water - keeping nutrients in the land instead of in the lake where it causes harm. We have begun a conversation with the PFRA and U and K Green House to insure that the right kind of plant material is available for the residents of Katepwa. Information on how to acquire the "Katepwa Poplar" will be available soon.

SANDY BEACH IMPROVEMENTS

For those that may not been out since the fall or for those of you who have cottages in Sandy Beach, many trees have been planted in the green space by the tennis courts and play centre. Trees and bushes have been strategically planted on two of the Right Of Ways (ROW's) to help stabilize eroded water edges/banks and also to provide water filtering for the purpose of cleaning our lake. More bush will be planted on ROWs in the Spring to prevent further erosion of the lake banks. The trees and bushes have been provided by the District and by local residents. Thank you to all the Sandy Beach residents that took time to plant and water the trees. The trees and bushes planted by the play center will not only provide shade and wind break, but also beauty and color.

KATEPWA & DISTRICT LIONS PROVIDES 10 YEARS OF SERVICE!

February marks the 10th anniversary of community service by the Katepwa Lions and District Lions. Throughout the past 10 years the Lions have been involved in a variety of projects and services. The Club has donated to the Guide Dog Program, Children's Hospital; and, closer to home, the Balcarres Integrated Care Centre and the Balcarres Lions Hall. On the recycle front, the Lions recycle used eye glasses, and have been involved in a variety of recycling projects.

Much of the kitchen equipment at the Katepwa Centre has been supplied by the Lions. Recent acquisitions have been bridge tables and a new computer for the Library. The park benches throughout the District and a play structure in the Provincial Park have been supplied and installed by members of the Lions. The most recent acquisitions have been AEDs (Automated External Defibrillator) and the trailer for the EMO Equipment.

Annually, the Lions conduct an Adopt the Highway program and provide maintenance on the Christmas lights and have provided assistance to Theatre on the Hoof, Perchfest, Get Active Glenwood and Breeze Park.

These activities are funded annually by the Fish Derby and Texas Hold'em tournaments. These fundraisers enable us to contribute to July 1 entertainment.

This year's Fish Derby will be held March 12, 2016.

LOVE YOUR LAKE PROGRAM

LQWS is currently working on a partnership with the District of Katepwa and Watershed Canada to bring the "Love your Lake" program to Katepwa: "Healthy Shorelines for Healthy Lakes". Love Your Lake is a shoreline assessment and stewardship program that provides shoreline property owners with resources to help improve the health of their shoreline and their lake. This program is developed by the Canadian Wildlife Federation and Watersheds Canada and lake organizations to deliver it locally.

As participants in the Love Your Lake program, properties are assessed on a property by property basis by boat using standardized assessment protocol. Once complete, each shoreline owner receives access to a personalized, confidential property report consisting of valuable information on the state of their unique shoreline with suggested voluntary actions for shoreline improvement. These simple suggested actions help protect and enhance shoreline and lake health - not just for our pleasure but for wildlife too!

We want you to know that the District of Katepwa is the first community in Saskatchewan to launch this program! We are a proud community because of the accomplishments we have done to make a better environment footprint and for doing our part to keep our lakes healthy! Over the next couple of months lakeshore property owners will be receiving a letter .

Did you know.....

The LQWS has a Research and Monitoring Committee?

At the Annual General Meeting in 2013 a motion was passed as follows:

To establish a working group to prepare a proposal for identifying the major contributors of nutrients and other pollutants to the Lower Qu'Appelle River to enable focused/targeted management actions, and;

Prepare a proposal for identifying the flow, lake and oxygen levels required to protect fish and other aquatic life within our system; and

Liaise with Water Services Agency, specifically the aquatic impacts hydrology groups, to obtain monitoring and research data from the basin and to obtain expert advice on applying this information to management of flows and pollutant sources.

We currently have members consisting of Ecologists, Scientists, and Agrologists representing Water Security and the Ministry of Agriculture and watershed managers from neighbouring regions.

The priority of this committee is to provide the watershed steward group with the information needed to achieve the water quality goals. A critical component of this information is to determine which nutrient sources must be managed more effectively in order to achieve water quality goals as set out in our watershed plan.

LQWS also partnered with the Ministry of Health to do weekly beach water sampling at various beaches within the community. We have been approached to do this again this summer.

INVASIVE SPECIES ZEBRA MUSSELS THREAT

Last summer, you may have seen our student, Alex, cruising around in her PT Cruiser spreading the word about Zebra Mussels. She handed out fact sheets about the Aquatic Invasive Species as well as how to Clean + Drain + Dry YOUR BOAT. If you recall last summer, Lake Winnipeg announced that the lake was inundated with these mussels. Once introduced and established in the lake, they can spread rapidly – with one female producing up to a million eggs per year. They will disrupt natural food chains, create toxic algae blooms that can kill fish and birds, decrease property values and reduce recreational enjoyment of the natural areas. These mussels also pose a risk for cottages and homes that rely on these waterways for their water supply because they clog pumps, not to mention boat motors! Please if you suspect that mussels have attached to your equipment please call the TIP line at 1-800-667-7561.

We had substrate samplers located at all lakes throughout our watershed monitoring for Zebra Mussels, fortunately none were detected. However, let's keep on keeping them out of our beautiful lakes! We will be working again with the Ministry of Environment to bring more awareness of Aquatic Invasive Species this summer. Strategic plans to deal with this serious threat is occurring at various levels of local government. Watch the website for more information.

Sewage Survey

It was a very busy year for the Lower Qu'Appelle Watershed Stewards (LQWS) in 2015. The Sewage Survey is complete. Thank you to everyone that participated in the survey and a big thanks to the Administrative Staff at the District for entering all the data.

The information collected will be an excellent record to keep on file at the District office. It was good to talk to many residents this past summer to explain why we were asking for this information. We also increased awareness of private sewage systems and current wastewater management practices. It is important to know the effects and the consequences of improper disposal of greywater and sewage in the lakes.

We are happy to announce that one or possibly two more neighbouring communities will be undertaking the Sewage Survey.
