BUDGET REPORT:

Submitted by Mayor Weekley

The 2011 Balanced Budget was submitted and approved by council on May 21, 2011.

Council has approved a mill rate of for 2011 of 7 mills, up slightly from last year. The minimum tax is now \$325.00. The Education portion of your assessment has decreased slightly to 9.51 mills (for residential properties).

THE FLOOD OF 2011 – A TIME WE WILL NEVER FORGET

Put it in the record books - Katepwa Lake levels reached new peaks, causing significant property damage and an incredible cascade of events.

It all started in the dead of winter, when we were aware there would be higher than normal run-off and lake levels. The District of Katepwa purchased sand bags in anticipation of the need for property protection and posted advisories to residents.

For the first two weeks of April, Katepwa staff and residents dealt with property damage due to significant run-off. New creeks were flowing where they had never seen before, roads were damaged and properties were flooded. Our one man crew (Corey) was kept busy trying to redirect water to safe areas!

Then came the much more ominous high lake level threat: on April 16, 2011, the District of Katepwa declared a state of emergency due to significant risk of property damage. This allowed the District to secure resources to assist residents to create sand bag walls to

protect against high water levels in advance of the deluge.

The water levels rose steadily until Wednesday, April 28, when Katepwa reached a new peak of 479.54 meters above sea level, breaking the 1974 level of 479.5 meters. It eventually peaked at 479.59 meters above sea level.

On April 29 and 30, "Mother Nature" did her worst. Just as the ice was breaking up, and with the lake at peak levels, high winds and waves created the "perfect storm". These waves, up to 7 feet high, crashed into sandbag berms and knocked several feet of it down in places, flooding some properties. After a very hard fight, residents and volunteers had to succumb to the battle and were evacuated in the name of safety.

Wave action with unprecedented high water marks continued to damage shorelines throughout the shoreline properties for several weeks. The impact of this will be felt forever.

Organizing the manpower and equipment to deal with trying to hold back a lake of water was an incredible feat. With Mayor Fred Weekley at the helm, and assisted by Administrator Glenda Hodson, "Flood Central" was immediately created (and underwent many modifications over the following weeks). Armed with a plan of attack, volunteers were organized, fed, directed to areas of need and kept safe. Equipment was brought in. A chain of information gathering and sharing was created.

Warren Bobbee, formerly an Emergency Measures Coordinator for the City of Regina and now a resident of Katepwa, became our new EMO coordinator - we cannot say enough about his leadership in this time of crisis! Curtis Kemp, a police officer by training, was our Emergency Centre Coordinator. Don Urzada shared this role. Corey Hodson and Ben Behnke were Warren's "Right-Hand Men", incredibly valuable in getting jobs done, working very long hours for extended periods of time.

The flood of 2011 continued...

The leadership team that stepped up to the plate also included Elaine Chatterson and Eileen Fisher, as coordinators of the volunteers. Team captains were Dwight Fisher (Sandy Beach), Mitzi Brittner (East Maples), Karen Behnke (West Maples), Lorne Bennett (Boyle Place) and John Bergquist (Lakeside). Marg Smith coordinated all the food, and Eldeen Boehmer and Ann Meyer were at the sand bagger every day serving it to volunteers. Sandy Weekley was at Flood Central daily, taking minutes for every meeting, taking on any job asked of her. Many others, too numerous to mention, were there every single day.

Katepwa also became a hub to assist residents in other districts. Our volunteers created sand bags for residents of B-Say-Tah, RM of North Qu'Appelle, Standing Buffalo Reserve, Fort San and Echo Lake. Many people came from surrounding communities to get the "official update" every morning, which was reported by Warren Bobbee. As Warren stated, we were "kind of a big deal".

Many stories will remain, but one continuous theme that was, and will be said many times – the greatest resource was its volunteers!

There were stories of 40 people coming to the rescue at once, forming a human chain to transport sand bags to hold in rushing water, incredible donations of human time and energy (from far and wide, including from other provinces), people providing food for volunteers, donations of equipment. etc. Other communities came to our aid. too - help came from Youth Groups and the Balcarres Fire Department, Lions Clubs from Balcarres, Fort Qu'Appelle and Indian Head for example. Many people were there at the sand bagger, driving the ATVs, and supplying equipment. Unfortunately they are too numerous to mention - the list includes 500 people!!

While there are many examples of good deeds, the devastation this has caused to many residents is awful and overwhelming. We are grieving for those whose property and homes were affected by the flooding.

> Now the cleanup begins. Please do not put the sand in the lake, Ministry of Environment frowns on it and they have a pad full of blank tickets that they are willing to help you fill out should you not take heed!

> Clean up locations will be detailed further along in this late spring letter but it is important to NOT take lake refuse to the landfill. Other arrangements have been made to handle this overload.

> Recovery and restoration will be foremost on your minds, our Administrator (Glenda) has all the details you will need and will be communicating with residents information on what they can expect and how to go about receiving compensation for flood recovery and protection. Watch the web site for updates.

> So Buck up, there's a July 1st party coming and a volunteer party about to happen.

A closing note... prior to this flood we were a loose (sometimes awkward) association of three communities. Now we are the District of Katepwa Beach and I'm proud to say that's where I call home!

CLEANING UP AFTER THE FLOOD:

Now that that flood waters have receded somewhat our minds (and bodies) shift to the great clean up that faces the District. There are a few rules that must apply –

There are two designated stations to take sand bags and other flood related debris - please do not take anything to the landfill:

- 1. Sandy Beach Area near tennis courts; and
- 2. Breese Park South end of Katepwa Lake

Sandbags: Sandbags in proximity to the lake must be removed once no longer needed. Sandbags should not be dumped into or around the lake. Sand can be deposited on your lot above the high water mark as long as the sand is contained so that it cannot erode into the lake.

Depositing sand into the lake or on the shoreline can harmfully alter or destroy fish habitat. Depending on its source, sand can contain harmful substances that are prohibited from entering the lake. Dumping of sand into the lake or on the shoreline is a potential violation of the Federal Fisheries Act and/or the Provincial Environmental Management Protection Act. Violations can result in substantial fines and remediation of the site to its original state.

Deposit all plastic sheeting and empty sand bags in the **BLUE** BIN. Dump the sand beside the bin. Private contractors are available to dispose of sandbags. Please call the office at 332-6645 for more information.

Flood Debris from Interior spaces only (e.g. drywall, insulation): Deposit into the RED BIN located in Breese Park only (south end of Katepwa Lake)


Lake Debris: Any debris removed from the lake can be taken to either of the above sites. Please do not take this to the landfill; other arrangements have been made for disposal.

Lost & Found: If you have lost something, or found something that isn't yours, in the wind and waves have a look at these sites you might be able to retrieve your missing property. (Eg. sets of stairs, signs, chairs, tables, etc.)

Shoreline Damage/Repair: ALL repairs to shorelines require a Shoreline Alteration Permit. This can be obtained by contacting the Ministry of Environment at 332-3215.

The key to an emergency response and preparedness plan is having the correct contact information for each resident. There have been many pleas in the past to make sure that the office has your current contact information (phone, cell, email) and after this spring you understand why. With your tax notices you will find a form requesting information from you. Please take the time to complete the details and return the Emergency Contact Sheet with your tax payment. Please don't assume that people know how to get a hold of you – in the eye of an emergency there isn't always time to track you down!
